## Cool Tool - Be Safe, Be Respectful Stop, look, listen = Have fun

School-Wide Expectation: All students should be safe and respectful while on the playground.

Location: Playground

Purpose: To maintain an emotionally and physically safe environment for students to play. Students should also display respect for each other by taking turns and including others.

Explanations: Students should display respect by including everyone, using kind words, sharing, and using equipment appropriately. Students should be safe by following the rules/directions, keeping their hands and feet to themselves and lining up appropriately.

#### Discussions

- 1. Kim and John were playing on the playground and decided to jump off the equipment. Kim fell and hit her head. What should they have done to keep safe? If a friend of yours wants to make a bad choice what can you do?
- 2. After lunch the teacher took her class outside for 20 minutes. When the twenty minutes were up the teacher called for everyone to line up. Some students took a long time to line up and Jimmy didn't go inside at all. Was this respectful to the teacher? Was Jimmy safe? What would a better choice be? Should the students go out for recess again tomorrow?
- 3. Amy wants to play jump rope with her friends. They tell she can not play because she is not their friend today. Are the girls being respectful to Amy? How does Amy feel?
- 4. How can play fighting end up with someone getting seriously hurt or suspended from school?

"Hands are not for taking!"

School Wide Expectation: Students will be respectful and responsible in our school.

Location: Building Wide

Purpose: To promote a safe learning environment

Explanations: It's important to be responsible and respectful while at school. This means to only use things that are yours or that you have permission for. If a student sees someone take something that isn't theirs they should tell an adult.

## Discussions:

- As you walk to the cafeteria you see someone go into Mrs.
   McClora's desk. There was no adult in her office. What should you do?
- 2. A group of boys are talking in the library about how they stole calculators from the teacher. What would be a responsible decision?
- 3. You see what a classmate has in their backpack and are thinking about going to get it. Would this be a good choice? What is a better option?

UNIVERSAL EXPECTATION: Be Safe

NAME OF SKILL/SETTING: Safe School Bus Rider and Bus

**SEL STANDARD: 3A** 

#### PURPOSE OF THE LESSON/WHY IS IT IMPORTANT.

1. To prevent accidents by obeying bus rules.

2. To know that the bus driver is in charge and should be listened to.

#### **TEACHING EXAMPLES**

- 1. You're sitting on the bus and your friend wants you to change seats. The bus is moving, so you now that you have to stay seated and face forward. You stay where you are and tell your friend you'll sit with them tomorrow.
- 2. You get a treat at the end of the day. You remember that you can't eat on the bus, so you put it in your backpack and wait until the end of the day to eat your treat.
- 3. The bus is at school waiting in the driveway. No teachers are on bus duty yet. You want to get ready to leave the bus, but you remember to wait until the bus driver tells you it's OK to leave.

#### STUDENT ACTIVITES/ROLE PLAYS

- 1. Practice sitting properly in the seat and telling a friend you can't change seats.
- 2. Role-play a child putting a treat in a backpack.
- 3. Role-play the bus in the driveway with someone being the bus driver and telling the student it's OK to get off the bus.

#### FOLLOW UP/ REINFORCEMENT ACTIVITES

- 1. Pre-correct proper bus behavior at the end of the day and at school meetings.
- 2. Continue with the Best Bus Award each week.
- 3. Have children nominate other children for following bus rules.

UNIVERSAL EXPECTATION: Be Safe

NAME OF SKILL/SETTING: Appropriate Touch

**SEL STANDARD: 2C** 

## PURPOSE OF THE LESSON/WHY IS IT IMPORTANT.

- 1. To teach appropriate physical boundaries
- 2.To be safe by reducing physical aggression and increasing social appropriate behaviors

#### TEACHING EXAMPLES

- 1. Teach appropriate touch for school (wave, handshake, high 5).
- 2. Teach appropriate touch for home/family (hugs, kissing, holding hands).
- 3. Read Hands Are Not for Hitting
- 4. Make placemats with students names, handprints, and positive things hands can do.

#### STUDENT ACTIVITES/ROLE PLAYS

- 1. Ask students to place *Boardmaker* pictures of hugging, kissing, handshakes, handholding in appropriate category: home or school.
- 2. Ask students to identify and practice positive things that hands can do: clapping, high five, waving, etc...
- 3. Have students greet each other at morning meeting with handshakes.

### FOLLOW UP/ REINFORCEMENT ACTIVITES

- 1. Use *Model Me Kids* video lesson that teaches keeping hands to self (ask social workers to borrow this resource)
- 2. Redirect students to handshake if they attempt to hug or kiss a staff or peer.

## Discussions:

- 1. A group of your friends has been playing a game in the cafeteria where they poke each other when least expected. What should you do? Should you play too? Are there consequences for this type of game? What could you do instead?
- 2. 2 people in your class have been picking on some other student. Your peers want you to join in. You think if this keeps happening there will be a fight. Do you join in? Do you tell a teacher? Do you talk to your friends?
- 3. You hear a rumor that someone wants to fight you afterschool. How should you handle the information?
- 4. While in line at the water fountain, Billy pushes you out the way. What should you do next?

Location: Lunch Room

Purpose: To alleviate inappropriate behaviors during lunchtime.

### Explanations:

Students should be able to eat lunch and follow the procedures and rules for lunchroom behavior.

#### FOR DISCUSSION

What are the rules for the lunchroom?

- 1. Students will sit and remain seated until dismissal.
- If the student requires assistance they should raise their hand and wait to be acknowledged by the lunchroom supervisor.
- 3. Students should clean up their table area when they finish eating.
- 4. When lunch is over students should have their tray ready for pick-up and disposal.
- 5. Students will line up according to the lunch supervisors directions silently. Students with lunch boxes or bags should carry them back to their classrooms.

### Scenarios:

You want to get up to throw away your trash before lunch is over. Should you get up?

NO! YOU SHOULD REMAIN AT YOUR TABLE AND RAISE YOUR HADN TO ASK FOR PERMISSION TO WALK AROUND DURING LUNCH.

You are mad at the people you usually sit with and you want to sit somewhere else for the day. Should you switch tables?

NO! YOU SHOULD RAISE YOUR HAND AND ASK YOUR SUPERVISOR IF YOU CAN SIT AT ANOTHER TABLE. IF THE SUPERVISOR SAYS NO THEN YOU MUST REMAIN WHERE YOU ARE.

## Be Respectful

School Wide Expectation: Use Appropriate Language when addressing peers or staff members

Location: Building-Wide

Purpose: Students should be able to communicate with others WITHOUT name calling or using curse words.

### Teaching Examples:

 Robbie and Katie are playing together. Katie has a toy that Robbie wants but she won't give it to him. Robbie curses at Katie and calls her a bad name.
 Katie cries and doesn't want to be Robbie's friend anymore

When you curse at someone you are using bad language that can hurt people's feelings. You should use kinds and respectful words when talking to others.

2. Michael heard his dad use a curse word last night. He goes to school and says it to others in his classroom. The other students are upset with Michael and stay away from him.

#### Activities:

- Students can role play and model how to use respectful words and manners (ex. Saying excuse me, not cutting in line, apologizing, saying please/thank you)
- 2. Brainstorm examples of positive/respectful words to use in school.
- 3. Discuss negative words- how they make you feel and consequences for using them

They are cursing and using inappropriate language to tell the story. What should you do? Should you say something to them about their language?
- 2. Your classmate continues to call your name and talk to you during quiet time. You are getting upset and want to tell them off. What should you do instead? Who could you talk to? Is there a nice way to say leave me alone?
- 3. Tim is writing curse words on his desk. He is showing his classmates but they don't think it's funny. How do you think Tim feel now? What should he do next? Is this a good idea? Why/why not?

#### Kids Activities

- 1. Students can role play other scenarios and discuss the appropriate response to disrespectful words.
- 2. Students can brainstorm and find other words that can be used to express themselves.

#### Reinforcement Activities

- 1. Compliment students for using appropriate language in various situations especially when addressing their peers.
- 2. Reinforce expected behavior with a tiger ticket.

Location: Building Wide

#### INTRODUCTION

Introduce the topic of property by providing a definition to the class.

Property- something you or another person owns.

### **ACTIVITY**

**Brainstorm:** Have the students brainstorm a list of objects in the classroom or on the school grounds that belong to themselves, classmates, teacher, and school.

**Discussion:** Discuss with your students what happens when property is damaged or destroyed. Explain how important it is to take care of all property.

NAME OF THE SKILLS: Respect others, yourself, all things & learning

#### PURPOSE OF THE LESSON / WHY IT'S IMPORTANT

 Students need to respect others, self, all things, and learning to provide a safe dismissal environment.

#### TEACHING EXAMPLES:

1. Your teacher says its time to go home for the day. You get all your belongings like your coat, backpack, lunchbox, and homework. You remember you can't come back to school after you leave the building so you double-check that you have all of your belongings. You remember to listen to your teacher and you wait until he or she dismisses you. As you're walking safely down the hall and out the door to the flagpole you see your friend from another class and you want to play together after school. But, she rides the bus and she kindly reminds you that you need to talk after you get home from school.

#### **KID ACTIVITIES / ROLE PLAYS:**

1. Role-play teaching examples on the blacktop or in the classroom.

#### FOLLOW-UP / REINFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES:

- 1. Adults will review rules as appropriate.
- 2. Review appropriate doors for walkers and bus riders
- 3. Ask 2-4 different students how they will show respect during arrivals.
- 4. Verbally praise students who follow rules.

- Adults will review rules as appropriate.
